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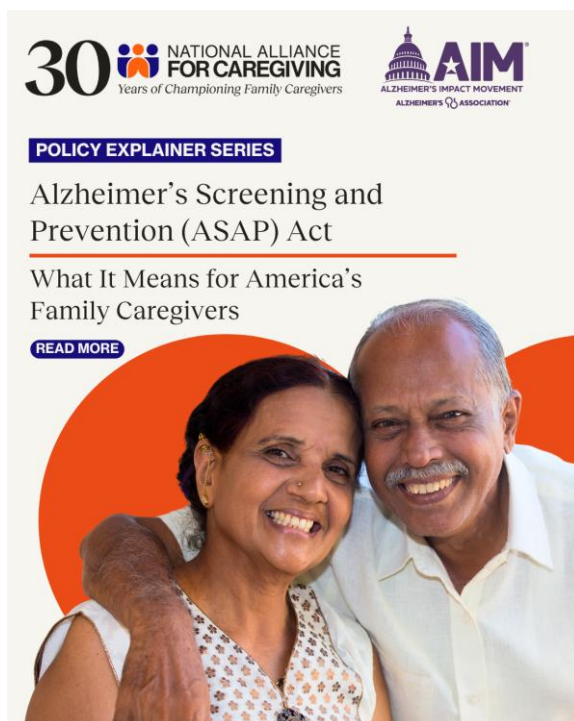

📌 NEW POLICY EXPLAINER: The **National Alliance for Caregiving**, **Alzheimer's Association**, and **Alzheimer's Impact Movement** break down what the ASAP Act means for family caregivers.

More than 59 million Americans are caring for an adult with a serious illness or disability – and 1 in 4 of them are caring for someone with Alzheimer's, dementia, or another memory related condition.

The bipartisan Alzheimer's Screening and Prevention (ASAP) Act (S. 3267 / H.R. 6130) would let Medicare cover blood test screenings for dementia – giving families something they desperately need: time.

- ✅ Time to plan
- ✅ Time to access services
- ✅ Time to pursue treatment
- ✅ Time to prepare, emotionally and financially

Right now, 17% of caregivers say they're "not sure" if their loved one has a memory issue. Earlier, simpler screening could close that gap and get families answers sooner.

Nearly 80% of Americans say they'd want to know their diagnosis while symptoms are still mild or before they appear.

Alzheimer's changes brains up to 20 years before symptoms appear but most families don't get answers until much later.

The bipartisan Alzheimer's Screening and Prevention (ASAP) Act (S. 3267 / H.R. 6130) would let Medicare cover blood test screenings for dementia, helping families get answers sooner instead of navigating uncertainty alone.

Today, 17% of caregivers say they are "not sure" if their loved one has a memory issue. And nearly 80% of Americans say they would want to know their diagnosis while symptoms are still mild or before they even start.

Earlier detection means more time: to plan, to access care, to pursue treatment, and to make decisions together as a family. That's time families deserve.

"Caring for your aging parents is not something easily prepared for, but it is a relief to know that there are ways doctors can be of more help." – Rachel, New York, caregiver to her mother who has dementia.

This September, during World Alzheimer's Month, the **National Alliance for Caregiving**, **Alzheimer's Association**, and **Alzheimer's Impact Movement** are sharing Rachel's story as a reminder of what's at stake for millions of families like hers. Nationally, 38% of caregivers report high emotional stress. 24% say they feel alone. When a loved one's memory loss goes undiagnosed, that toll only grows.

Right now, only 43% of care recipients have a future care plan in place. Without a diagnosis, families can't put one together – no powers of attorney, no conversations about care preferences, no time to get their affairs in order while their loved one can still take part in those decisions.

The ASAP Act (S. 3267 / H.R. 6130) would let Medicare cover blood test screenings for dementia, giving families the chance to plan while it still matters.
